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As the dust of the provincial election settles, residents in Richmond Hill expressed their expectations for the newly elected MPPs and the issues that matter the most to them.


The Liberal asked six residents who live in the Richmond Hill riding and Aurora-Oak Ridges — Richmond Hill riding about what they are hoping for from their next provincial representatives. Here is what they had to say.

Communication is key for Kate Jiang, a local business owner, and for Aizick Grimman, a father who runs his own business.

"I do hope the MPP can communicate with the residents and represent his or her constituency to bring their voices to Queen's Park," said Jiang, who has lived in the Richmond Hill riding for 10 vears.

The Chinese immigrant said

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PROVINCIAL ELECTION DAISY WAI 'GRATEFUL' TO BE **RE-ELECTED IN RICHMOND HILL**

Cheers and applause filled Turtle Jack's, a local restaurant in Richmond Hill as Daisy Wai, the Progressive Conservative candidate celebrated her victory in the 2022 provincial election on June 2.

Wai, who was first elected as the MPP in the Richmond Hill riding in 2018, was re-elected around 9:30 p.m. when a majority of polls were counted in the riding.

"I'm grateful and happy. I can see a lot of things that are really good and I want to make sure we can put Ontario back on track," Wai told the Liberal at the victory party surrounded by family, friends and supporters.

"In Richmond Hill riding, I still want to care for the seniors. I was visiting a lot of senior homes and I have also worked with our local organizations caring for the seniors... Seniors in Richmond Hill are growing in leaps and bounds. I want to make sure they enjoy life."

The unofficial results from Elections Ontario showed that Wai took home a total of 15,614 votes -52.56 percent - leading her closest competitor Liberal candidate Roozbeh Farhadi by 6.252 votes.

Farhadi took home a total 9,362 votes, 31.51 per cent while NDP candidate Raymond Bhushan got 2,707 votes, 9.11 per cent.There are a total of 86,011 registered voters in the riding where 34.54 per cent of them turned out to vote in this election.

During the month-long campaign, Wai did not show up to two all-candidates events in the riding, which has prompted questions from the public about her absence. The candi-

date told the Liberal that she's been "campaigning hard."

She said some candidates have chosen to participate in the events and others have chosen to spend their time taking their message directly to voters at the door.

Prior to her taking office in 2018, Wai said she was very active in the local PC riding association. Outside politics, Wai has been running an advertising business for over 25 years.

In 2018, Wai garnered more than 22,000 votes defeating her Liberal component Reza Moridi who represented the riding from 2007 to 2018.

Created in 2003 from parts of Oak Ridges riding, the Richmond Hill riding is bordered by Highway 407 to the south, Highway 404 to the east, Elgin Mills Road, Shirley Drive and Major Mackenzie Road to the north and Bathurst Street to the west.

With a population of 110,177 as of 2016, the Richmond Hill riding has a good mix of ethnic diversity. One third of its population identified themselves as Chinese making it the largest ethnic group in the riding. There were 13,260 residents who identified as Iranian, making up for more than 12 per cent of the population in the riding.

PROTECTING HER LITTLE GIRL

Yvonne, a 40-year-old widow, was taken by surprise by her doctor's diagnosis. Her doctor confirmed that she had a terminal illness and that she only had about three to six months to live. She felt that she was too young to die, especially because her only daughter, Emily, was only eight years old.

For five years, Yvonne had lived with her boyfriend, Eugene. They were going to get married someday. Now, Yvonne knew that the wedding day would never come.

She came to speak to me about two weeks after her diagnosis. She was very concerned about Emily and wanted to make her will so that Emily would have the best protection possible.

An important first step in making her will was for me to ask Yvonne about a guardian for little Emily. I carefully asked her, "Whom do you want to name in your will as Emily's guardian? As you know, this is who you would select to raise Emily after you're gone." She began to sob and said, "Two months ago, we were celebrating Emily's eighth birthday party. I could never have imagined that something like this would happen to me." She said that she had trouble thinking this through because it all happened so fast. She was very uncertain about whether she should name her sister or her mother. Her sister was very close to her, but had three of her own children, and Yvonne was worried that the added weight of another child might burden her sister financially. As well, Yvonne was worried about whether Emily would get enough attention from her sister. On the other hand, Yvonne's mother was seventy years old, and while she was capable and loving, Yvonne was worried about how long her mother would be up to taking care of a young girl like Emily.



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Yvonne asked me to draft the will leaving the name of the guardian blank, and said she would call me during the week to let me know who she would name. She called three times, naming her sister the first time, then changing it to her mother, then back to her sister, and that is how the draft of the will ended up, in preparation for her appointment the following week.

I will never forget that appointment. Yvonne came to the office with her boyfriend Eugene and her daughter Emily. Yvonne introduced me to both of them. Emily was carrying magic markers and a paint-by-numbers book. Eugene was sombre, respectful, and very quiet. He sat with Emily in the waiting room while Yvonne came into the boardroom with me so that she could review the will before she signed it.

As she sat at the boardroom table, she began to cry. "Who would know the special stories Emily loves? They are the ones we made up together. Who would know the special way I brush her hair, or the games we play after supper?" She went on and then, sobbing, said she couldn't name her sister as guardian. No way. Emily would not get enough attention. Yvonne was now out of breath, and crying so much that she needed more tissue.

As I went out to get a box of tissue for her, I could still hear her crying. So could Emily and Eugene. Emily looked up from her paint-by-numbers book, and asked Eugene, "What's wrong with Mommy?" Eugene patted her hand and told her he would straighten everything out. He walked into the boardroom with me, and Yvonne hugged him and cried, "I don't know what to do! I don't know what to do!" Suddenly Yvonne became a little girl and just looked at Eugene. I had to explain to Eugene what Yvonne's dilemma was. I don't think the words were out of my mouth for twenty seconds, when Eugene said, "Yvone, name me. Emily is part of my love for you. I will never let you down, and as long as I live, I will never let her down."

Through her tears, Yvonne told Eugene that she had never wanted to chain him to anything after she was gone. That is why she didn't initially name him as guardian. But Eugene repeated that Emily had been an important part of his own life. He looked upon her as his own daughter, and that the life he wanted was a life that included Emily. Yvonne then cried uncontrollably. Through her tears, she said, "I love you Gene and I always will. I promise that I will watch over the two of you forever."

It took a few minutes for Yvonne to regain her composure, and I was trying to keep mine. Yvonne nodded to me to finalize the will, naming Eugene as Emily's guardian.

Eugene left the boardroom when the final version of the will was brought in for signing. When Yvonne signed it in front of the witness and me, her only words were, "Now, I can pass away in peace, knowing that my daughter is in loving hands."

She then asked me to sit with her for a few minutes, while she wiped the tears from her eyes and her face. She held a small mirror, and her hand shook a bit as she did her best to apply some makeup. She did not want Emily to see that she had still been crying.

As I walked her out to the waiting room, Emily reached for her mother's hand, and that is how mother and daughter walked out the front door. Eugene walked behind them. That was the last time I ever saw them. Although many years have passed since then, every time I see a mother and a young daughter walking hand-in-hand, I think of Yvonne, and the love she left for Emily.

MICHAEL PARSA KEEPS AURORA-OAK RIDGES-RICHMOND HILL FOR PCS

VOTERS EXPRESS DISMAY AT LOW VOTER TURNOUT

Less than an hour after polling stations closed June 2, PC candidate Michael Parsa had been declared winner in the riding of Aurora-Oak Ridges-Richmond Hill.

Locally, the Liberals inched a little forward compared to the last vote in 2018 while NDP's share plummeted in comparison, but overall, voter turnout was the big loss here and across the province. Parsa earned 53 per cent of the votes (compared to 58 per cent in 2018), the Liberals' Marjan Kasirlou got 30 per cent (compared to 21.6 per cent), NDP's Reza Pourzad got 7.7 per cent (18 per cent in 2018) and Green's Kevin Zheng got 3.9 per cent (2.6 in 2018). It's the second victory for Parsa, first elected to represent this growing, multicultural community in 2018, and he was quick to express his gratitude. "I really do want to thank the people of Aurora-Oak Ridges-Richmond Hill from the bottom of my heart for this opportunity. It's a great honor," he said.

Runner-up Kasirlou, a rookie candidate for the Liberals, was disappointed, but philosophical. "This is democracy. The decision was made by the people. We just need to work harder in coming years to accomplish what we need to." With seven names on the ballot, including some lesser-known parties such as the Ontario Party, Ontario Moderate Party and New Blue, voters had plenty to choose from — and yet many who cast their ballots said polling stations seemed empty. Richmond Hill resident

Kathryn Howell reported that at 4:30 p.m. on voting day, she was the only voter at the polling station at Corpus Christi school.

Oak Ridges resident Sherry Caldwell said her polling station was not busy, either.

"I'm worried that not enough people are engaged," she said. "We need real leadership... a new government that will ensure people with disabilities can live with dignity. The disability community has been forgotten and are in crisis."

Katie Karanicolopoulos, of Oak Ridges, was one of more than one million

leagues and "the people left behind" by the Ford government.

"At the end of the day, I'm really grateful for the experience I gained and the people I came to know."

Like the rest of Ontario, most voters in this riding were focused on three key issues: affordability, health care and development.

Cost of living and gas prices were a common concern Parsa heard on the campaign trail.

He viewed his victory and his party's - as a clear message that Ontario has resounding support for the PCs and the direction the

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people who opted to vote in advanced polls in Ontario.

"I voted because it's a democratic process, a privilege," she said. "This election was more about what I don't want to see, than promises that wowed me.
I'm worried that we'll go back to what we were fighting for and against in 2019 and that nothing was

learned since then."

Kasirlou, a registered nurse who made her first run for office in the Aurora-Oak Ridges-Richmond Hill riding, said she won't give up fighting for her colprovince is heading.

"After two years of pandemic, we need to make sure that we get our economy going again," he said.


"We need to continue investing in our health care. We need hospitals. We need schools built. We need roads and bridges and highways. We need to continue to provide support for business. she hopes information can be made more accessible for new immigrants who don't speak English well to make sure their input can be heard by the government on important local projects such as transportation and development.

"I'd like a representative that actually answers constituent calls," said Grimman from the Aurora— Oak Ridges — Richmond Hill riding.

"On the big picture, it would be great if any of the parties acknowledged the basic reality that little kids have no vaccine at all to take," he said. "Parents like me who take the threat seriously have no representation I've scaled back my work to 1-2 days a week to keep us afloat while keeping the kids home."

Tyler Barker, an Aurora—Oak Ridges — Richmond Hill riding resident and advocate for disability and accessibility issues, also talked about what he expected in the field of health care.

"I wish whatever government MPP is elected here will improve health care ... I want to see more checks and balances to where the money is going to these for-profit agencies and not just shovelling out money."

Meanwhile, development and environment are top of mind for many residents that the Liberal has spoken to.

The biggest issue for Marj Andre, a well-known community leader who lives in the Richmond Hill riding, is the proposed massive development in the High tech Transit-Oriented Community (TOC) at Yonge Street and Highway 7.

"I hope whoever the next MPP will be will be more attuned to how to build a good community and understand what it really means to build a good community in Richmond Hill," Andre said.

The provincial government issued two minister's zoning orders to fast-track the developments of two TOCs, including the one in Richmond Hill. It will bring 33 towers ranging in height from 40 to 80 storeys to the city, doubling the density and height originally planned for the area.

The High Tech TOC is one of many development projects being planned or constructed across the city that have faced public pushback over concerns about livability.

"I think it (Richmond Hill) was much nicer before than now because of these huge buildings. I know they're for housing, and I'm actually for housing. But somehow, I think they lose the natural things and go to these highrise buildings. And traffic just becomes unbearable," said Nahid Missaghie, an Iranian immigrant who has lived in Richmond Hill for 35 years.

Carol Davidson from Oak Ridges said, "There has been an explosion of development proposals in Richmond Hill over the past four years ... We need leadership that recognizes a healthy economy must include an environmental plan, regardless of party."

Jiang said she expects Richmond Hill to continue to grow as a modern city in the future, noting "not just a place for living and housing but no supporting facilities. Nobody wants that, right?"

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




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MUNICIPAL ELECTION DAVID WEST SEEKS RE-ELECTION

'OUR MEETINGS ARE STILL SOMEWHAT UNSETTLED I ACKNOWLEDGE, BUT I THINK THEY'RE BETTER THAN THEY WERE AND I THINK THERE'S MORE ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT': MAYOR DAVID WEST

Five months into his role as mayor of the City of Richmond Hill, David West has thrown his hat in the ring again in the hopes of staying mayor for another term come the Oct. 24 municipal election.

West officially registered to run as a candidate in Richmond Hill's election on May 27, becoming the first person who has put his name forward for the upcoming mayoral race.

"It wasn't a hard decision," West told the Liberal May 30. "I had already made that commitment when I decided to run in the byelection. It is my commitment to continue doing it."

Having served on council for eight years as Ward 4 councillor, West took office as mayor in a byelection in January following the retirement of former mayor Dave Barrow.

Richmond Hill council had been stranded in frequent council votes split 4-4 as the former mayor went on a medical leave for more than six months and stepped down after returning briefly to council last September.

The eight-member council struggled to conduct regular city businesses amid constant bickering and name-calling for months while the city searched for its next mayor in the middle of the CO-VID-19 pandemic.

West came on top in the mayoral byelection, garnering more than 13,000 votes, defeating fellow councillors Godwin Chan, Carmine Perrelli and Joe DiPaola.

"I think things have improved. Our meetings are still somewhat unsettled I acknowledge, but I think they're better than they were and I think there's more room for improvement," West said.

The mayor said he is confident in continuing to lead the Richmond Hill council to work together better in the future because "we all work for the same people".

Outside the council chambers, the city currently faces many challenges as it always has as a growing community, West said, noting issues about the High Fava Somenila/Matroland

Tech transit-oriented community (TOC), population growth as well as the aftermath of the pandemic.

As the city is on track to finalize several policies including the official plan, parks, recreation and cul-

ture master plan and transportation master plan, West said he's excited to see all these guiding documents coming together and being updated.

"We're starting to see a pent-up demand for so many things that make our community great, including arts and culture. Things like that need to be done. The whole idea of diversity, equity and inclusion and strengthening our ability to live in a really inclusive community, I believe that's incredibly important for Richmond going forward."

While West has made his intentions known, campaign activity will not begin in earnest until after the provincial election June 2, according to a news release from West's campaign manager.

With the weather warming up, the outdoors Ē beckons. After a long, dreary winter, residents are excited about discarding down jackets and boots and slipping into hoodies and running shoes. It's time to get those feet moving, and, luckily, there's no need to go far.

The GTA has many trails that provide the chance for exercise while enjoying a landscape that belies the urban environment. For an enjoyable local hike, make time to explore what this part of the province has to offer, with trails listed from east to west.

ROUGE NATIONAL URBAN PARK

Welcome to Canada's first urban national park. Across from the Toronto

Zoo, Rouge offers visitors 10 hiking trails ranging from 0.5 to 7.6 kilometres. Some are easy, others require moderate skill with elevation gains of 20 metres up to 173 metres. Walk through Carolinian forests, traverse an old logging route, or visit wetlands, meadows and grasslands. It's a nice place to picnic, and you can fish in the Rouge and tributaries if you have a licence. The park boasts more than 1,000 species of plants, 247 bird species, 73 fish species, 44 mammal species, and 27 reptile and amphibian species.

DORIS MCCARTHY TRAIL

Named for the Toronto artist who lived in the Scarborough Bluffs area, this trail takes walkers and off-road cyclists down a moderately steep hill to the shore of Lake Ontario and meanders along the base of the bluffs. See the sculpture that pays homage to McCarthy, view the cliffs, bird watch and stop for a picnic along the rocks. This out-and-back trail is accessed from Ravine Drive. It is also known as Gates Gully because the Gates Inn and Tavern stood nearby during the Upper Canada Rebellion and served as a rallying spot for the Scarborough Militia that defended Toronto.

LESLIE STREET SPIT

East of Cherry Beach on Ashbridge's Bay sits Tommy Thompson Park on the Leslie Street Spit. The spit is a human-created peninsula jutting into the bay, home to a variety of wildlife, including beavers, swans and groundhogs. It is a stopover for migrating birds, making it



popular with birders. These critters share the space with eager walkers, cyclists, runners and rollerbladers. The park's flat. paved, multi-use trail runs most of the length of the spit. There are also designated pedestrian trails and nature trails that bring visitors closer to the park's wildlife. There are also lovely views of the lake.

MOUNT PLEASANT CEMETERY

A cemetery trail may sound macabre, but it is also quiet and beautifully landscaped. The cemetery is not only a burial place, but an arboretum with many old, magnificent trees. It's so popular with locals, cemetery manager the Mount Pleasant Group has created one, three and five-kilometre trails. The grounds are well maintained vear-round and walkers, runners and cyclists can enjoy cherry blossoms in season, as well as blooming magnolias, chestnut trees and other species. For a bit of cemeterv tourism, visitors can seek the graves of musician Glenn Gould, prime ministers William Lyon MacKenzie King and John Turner, and Sir Frederick Banting and Charles Best, discoverers of insulin.

KAY GARDNER BELTLINE TRAIL

This trail is a wonderful option for a drizzly day because it is protected by tree canopy for much of its 4.5 kilometres. The dirt trail follows the rail bed of the old Toronto Belt Line Railway, stretching from Mount Pleasant Road to the Allen Expressway. Very popular with walkers, runners, cyclists and dog walkers and wide enough for physically distanced walks, it passes through Forest Hill and its

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rest stops are named for train stations of old. Iron horses line the bridge overlooking the subway line at Yonge Street, a favourite with children.

HUMBER RIVER RECRE **ATIONAL TRAIL, SOUTH**

The contiguous southern portion of this popular trail begins at Etienne Brulé Park near the Old Mill. It wends its way north through green spaces, around Baby Point, through Magwood Park and Lambton Woods and on to Lambton Park, home to the James Gardens. There are parallel routes, a paved multi-use path and a gravel/dirt trail for pedestrians. There are washrooms as well as park benches to sit and enjoy views of the Humber River, formerly a major Indigenous trading route. It is a lovely, albeit popular, urban wilderness, and you'll find birds, animals and wildflowers along its banks.

WATERFRONT TRAIL

If you've been to Harbourfront recently, you'll have noticed well-used walking and cycling lanes along Front Street. They are part of the 3,600-kilometre Great Lakes Waterfront Trail, which has three local sections: Etobicoke, Toronto and Scarborough. Its path is largely along the waterfront from Mimico in the west to Rouge Beach in the east. It wanders through Humber Bay Shores, Sunnyside Park, Queens Quay and Harbourfront, Cherry Beach and the Port Lands. In Etobicoke and Scarborough, sections meander through residential neighbourhoods, but stretches

along the water are the most scenic. **BRUCE TRAIL**

For an excursion outside the city, enjoy hiking or walking along one of Ontario's most iconic trails. The Bruce Trail stretches 900 kilometres along the Niagara Escarpment from Niagara to Tobermory along with many side paths. It is considered Canada's oldest and longest marked footpath. The section closest to Toronto runs from Milton to Cheltenham, about 50 kilometres. Hikers and walkers will see karst formations common to the escarpment: rock that has been eaten away by acidic water. Enjoy the forests, wetlands and farmlands as you trek along.

NASSAGAWEYA CANYON TRAIL

links two of Halton's conservation areas, Rattlesnake Point and Crawford Lake. If you do the round trip, allow four to five hours. You'll walk along the cliff line and through forests, see 1,000-year-old cedar trees, watch turkey vultures soaring on thermals and have a chance to explore the caves. Once you arrive at Crawford Lake, soak up Indigenous culture at the reconstructed 15th-century Iroquoian village. Excavations here led to the discovery of thousands of artifacts and 11 longhouses, three of which have been reconstructed based on archeological details and house interpretive programs. Note: Halton conservation areas

TEW FALLS AND DUNDAS PEAK If you like your waterfalls more intimate than Niagara, the Spencer Gorge Conservation Area in Dundas offers a good alternative. At Tew Falls, the wa-

ter from Logan's Creek tumbles 41 metres into the Spencer Gorge. By comparison, Horseshoe Falls is 52 metres high. From the falls, the trail takes you through the forest on to Dundas Peak at the mouth of the

gorge and offers excellent views as far as Hamilton Harbour. It's a loop trail and requires a reservation; if you want to include the wider Webster's Falls, a separate reservation is required.

Along the new trail system, there are several boardwalks and viewing platforms overlooking the ponds and wetlands. **GEORGINA – SIBBALD POINT Parking:** 26071 Park Rd., Sutton

Sibbald Point is open for day use year-round. The Maidenhair Fern trail is a two-kilometre, selfguided loop taking you through a variety of ecosystems.

MARKHAM - ROUGE NATIONAL UR-BAN PARK

Parking: 7277 14th Ave., Markham

This junction provides access to the 7.6 km Monarch trail, 3.3 km Reesor Way/Tanglewood trail and the 3.2 km Tallgrass Trek, each with its own nature escapes from the rare cedar savannah to meadows and wetlands.

CITY COUNCIL DECIDED TO INCREASE THE MAXIMUM GRANT THRESHOLD FOR THE BUILDING RENOVATIONS GRANT FROM \$50,000 TO \$100,000

As local businesses are navigating the post-pandemic economy, the City of Richmond Hill is offering another round of financial incentives to help existing businesses recover and attract new opportunities.

The city has renewed a grant program created in

2018 to encourage new office development and incentivize facade improvements in designated areas across the city, including the downtown core and older business parks.

City council adopted a proposal to renew the Office Development and Village Local Centre Revitalization Community Improvement Plan (CIP) program for another five years at the April 27 meeting.

"This is a program that I'm really pleased to see starting to get traction," Mayor David West said on council. "This is part of the solution to making sure we're doing all of the things we need to do to promote office space, to promote revitalization."

From 2018 to 2021, the city received 26 applications, including seven completed projects funded by

the city's grant program as well as the Ontario Main Street Revitalization Initiative grant program, according the city's policy planning manager Sybelle von Kursell.

The city and the prov-

ince invested about \$500,000 in these projects for signage, facade improvements and building renovations, in addition to about \$1 million private investment.

There are three grant

types in the CIP program tax increment equivalent grant for new offices, building renovation grant and facade improvement, landscape and signage grant, von Kursell said at her presentation to council.

At the meeting, city council decided to increase the maximum grant threshold for the building renovations grant from \$50,000 to \$100,000 to more reasonably represent the cost of such projects.

"The tax (increment equivalent grant) program is not quite popular right now. I think there's potential there. I look forward to building on the momentum for the rest of the program," West said.

The city has yet to receive any application for the tax increment equivalent grant for new offices, which is designed to support the development/intensification of the office and reduce the costs of the development.

It provides a grant equivalent to the municipal portion of the property tax for a new office development and limits the total impact of increased assessment and property taxes as a result of the development by phasing the increases in over a maximum period of 10 years or equivalent to the maximum cost of rehabilitation, renovation and/ or (re)development.

The changes to the CIP program will be undertaken through the formal CIP update process in accordance with the Planning Act, while budget approvals will occur through the city's normal operating budget process.

The city has begun accepting grant applications for 2022.


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
